#### Three Powerful Words: "I believe you."

The fear of not being believed is something that many survivors face, so making the decision to tell someone can be an intimidating, confusing and a challenging process. Our main concern is that the people that we work with feel as comfortable and as supported as possible.

Throughout our work with survivors, we have seen firsthand why saying, "I believe you" to a survivor is important. We don't say it implicitly or assume that survivors know that we believe them. We literally say the words, "I believe you".



"I believe you and I believe this happened to you because you are telling me that it happened to you". We want survivors to hear this message over and over until they hear it, feel it, and believe it. It is quite common that survivors don't receive this validation from people in their lives and for some survivors, that can become just as, or more painful than the sexual assault that they experienced.

There is so much research out there that shows how the cultural and interpersonal response to a survivor deeply impacts their ability to process and work through the trauma that they have experienced. Some people live their entire lives without ever telling anyone.

If a survivor chooses to disclose, who they disclose to is often the person that feels the safest. So how do we as individuals and as a community begin to create safety for survivors to reach out for support and make decisions on how to heal? Safety and support are given in the words, "I believe you", "I'm sorry that happened to you", "It's not your fault", "How can I help?". These may seem like simple statements, but ultimately they are catalysts for change in a culture where victim-blaming still exists. This shift can provide survivors with the validation, safety, trust and choice needed to decide what healing looks like for them.

If someone in your life discloses that they have experienced sexual violence, you may feel overwhelmed or uncertain on how to provide support. Trust your connection with the survivor and try to balance the support that you offer, with the support that you give yourself.

# SART Advocates/Direct Client Services A Continuum of Support

Our SART Advocates/Direct Client Services team has been very busy this past year as COVID restrictions have eased. We have seen an increase in calls to our support line and requests for hospital accompaniments, support with reporting to law enforcement and requests for accompaniment, advocacy and support through the civil and criminal legal systems.

We know and understand that there are many different pathways that survivors choose in their healing journeys. At the SACAC, it is our philosophy to provide support through each step of a survivor's healing journey by providing a continuum of support.



We know that when a survivor receives immediate, compassionate support, it has a significant impact in their healing. We also know that navigating through a sea of multiple services can be daunting and that without a continuum of support, a survivor is more likely to experience frustrating gaps in services.

We ensure that our services are accessible, seamless and progress with the survivor as they take their next steps toward healing. We provide services to survivors that are meaningful and relevant for them. One survivor may want long-term support to process their feelings, triggers and emotions; another may want a support group and yet another may just want support via a phone call to get through a difficult day or moment.

We are here to provide information and choices to survivors and to empower them to make the choices that they feel best meet their needs. We let survivors know that they are not alone, that they are believed and remind them that they have the inner strength necessary to heal and help brainstorm with them to assist with coping strategies, linkages with mental health/counseling support, and linkages with additional services that may assist them along the way.

Whether it's responding to the immediate needs of a recent survivor at the hospital or supporting a survivor through justice systems, or whether we are answering a phone call from a survivor that we worked with many years ago who called for support to get through a difficult moment; we make it a priority to let each survivor know that they are important and deserving of support.

It is a privilege to be invited to walk beside hundreds of survivors each year and we are reminded again and again of the incredible resilience and strength of survivors as they take brave steps toward their healing and recovery from trauma. We are here to help and provide support to a survivor regardless of what decisions they decide to make. We support survivors at every stage of the process and their individual journeys, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year.

#### **Call for Volunteers**



As a result of the pandemic, we have fewer volunteers to help cover our 24-hour support line. This is the case both state and nation-wide.

We have continued to provide emergency crisis response and accompaniment to survivors any time of the day or night. We are trying to re-establish an appropriate number of volunteers to support this effort. Volunteering is an incredible opportunity to be involved in the community and offer muchneeded support to survivors.

The time and passion that volunteers dedicate to SAC&SC is nothing short of extraordinary, taking on evening and weekend shifts to ensure we are there for survivors and our community. Volunteers are an integral component of being able to offer 24-hour support to survivors. Each volunteer brings valuable life experiences and skill sets to share, adding more dimensions and richness to our work. We extend our gratitude to all our past and present volunteers. They inspire us in our work to continue growing, learning and contributing to our shared commitments in supporting individuals impacted by sexual violence.

Volunteer advocate trainings are held virtually to make it easier for folks to participate and we are dedicated to increasing not only the number of volunteers, but also working to promote and recruit volunteers from diverse cultural and gender identities, professional backgrounds and lived experiences.

#### **Children's Advocacy Center Update**

The Children's Advocacy Center celebrated its 10-Year Anniversary in 2022. We have served over 2,500 children and their families. Before the Children's Advocacy Center opened its doors in 2012, young victims would be subjected to too many interviews with well-meaning social, legal, medical and law enforcement officials, each focused on only their part of the investigation. Today, we are proud to continue to offer a safe and neutral place for children and teens to talk about what happened to them. We are so thankful for



the continued partnerships with our multi-disciplinary team members. The Children's Advocacy Center (CAC) model is built on the belief that by working together with law enforcement, child protective services, prosecutors, sexual assault advocates, mental and medical health care professionals. Research shows that child victims and their families are better served by our collaboration.

As an Accredited Member of National Children's Alliance (NCA) since 2013, our center provides comprehensive, coordinated and compassionate services to victims of child abuse. Accredited CACs must undergo a reaccreditation process every five years to ensure that best practices are continually being applied. With accreditation standards being updated for 2023, our reaccreditation this year, reflects our Children's Advocacy Center's commitment to providing the most current evidence-based methods. We just submitted our extensive application in November 2022 and our site review visit, for reviewers to see our CAC space and meet with our multidisciplinary team members, will be in July 2023.

In 2022, we sought to improve our mental health collaboration for the children and families utilizing the CAC. The CAC Manager, Samantha Marquis and Family Services Coordinator, Julie Robertson started intensive training with the National Children's Alliance (NCA) with their Enhanced Early Engagement (E3) program. The goal is to increase the number of families who are screened for mental health needs, assessed for mental health treatment, referred for treatment and successfully complete treatment to heal from any negative impact from their abusive experience. Julie, assesses these needs by conducting a Child Behavioral Health Screening to every family while at the CAC, as well as assisting caregivers in identifying and overcoming any barriers to treatment success. The goal of this mental health initiative is to increase trauma focused mental health availability in Kennebec and Somerset counties, as well as increased engagement from the families seen at the Children's Advocacy Center serving Kennebec & Somerset counties.

#### **Outreach and Education**

#### Kathleen Paradis, Outreach and Education Manager

Providing prevention education and building awareness of Sexual Violence in the communities of Kennebec and Somerset Counties is a cornerstone of the SAC&SC mission, and it's been an extremely successful transition back to inperson training, classroom programming, and tabling at events. The return of gatherings like Skowpendous and Hallowell Pride seemed extra festive, and families looked thrilled to be out in the community sharing post-covid catch-ups.

#### **Curriculum Development**

Our Prevention Manager, Kathleen Paradis, is collaborating on a three-year project to build a pre-K-12 Sexual Violence Prevention curriculum. The statewide prevention team integrates Maine Learning Results, Health Education Standards, and best practices in evidence-based learning to create age-appropriate programming.

Research has shown that the best way to reduce sexual violence is through primary prevention. This comprehensive curriculum will provide consistency for students across the state and expand access for teachers who cannot bring in an outside Sexual Violence Prevention Educator.

#### **Youth Programming**

Last year, our Prevention Education team reached thousands of students at schools all over Kennebec and Somerset Counties. In 2018, the Maine Department of Education (DOE) created a Child Sexual Abuse Prevention Education and Response Model Policy to support schools in implementing effective child sexual abuse prevention policies. We help schools meet compliance by providing Personal Body Safety lessons to all students in K-5th grade.

We also provide education to middle and high school students, with familiar topics being Consent, Sexual Harassment, Bystander Intervention, and Media Literacy.

Our educators also provide "Walk In" hours at high schools for students that need extra support. Several students made disclosures last year, and the relevant reports were filed. One student was finally able to find safety after years of sexual abuse.

#### **Professional Development**

The MAPHERD (Maine Association of Health, Physical Education, Recreation and Dance) conference was back at the Samoset this past year. We presented to health teachers throughout the state on the intersection of CSEC (Commercial Sexualization and Exploitation of Children) and the media.

While there is no single type of survivor, characteristics commonly associated with sex trafficking survivors in Maine are white, female, and around 14 years old, which is why it's so essential that teachers and young people receive this information and know what CSEC looks like.
